Hello GREEN TEAM Teachers!

Last month, we sent out GREEN TEAM kits to over 190 schools that have registered so far this school year. If you registered recently, you'll receive a kit soon!

THE GREEN TEAM provides an assortment of resources to help you plan lessons and activities that engage your students with understanding environmental issues. These educational materials are available in THE GREEN TEAM kits mailed to all participants.

Some highlights include:

- The <u>Slash Trash Lesson</u>, which encourages students to track recycling, composting, and waste disposal at home as they identify and implement new waste-reduction activities.
- <u>Climate Change Activities</u> and <u>Scorecard</u>, which ask students to identify and track actions they
 can take to reduce greenhouse gas pollution.
- <u>Clean Air Activities</u>, which empower students to take actions to improve air quality by reducing vehicle exhaust and creating Idle-Free Zones at their school.

If your school is interested in creating an Idle-Free Zone, THE GREEN TEAM offers <u>free idling reduction</u> <u>signs and materials</u> for registered schools!

The next distribution day for GREEN TEAM recycling equipment for schools in the Boston area is November 16 in West Roxbury. Submit a <u>recycling equipment application</u> by November 13 to receive equipment this fall. The next distribution day in the Boston area will be in April.

GREEN TEAM Spotlight

Amesbury Elementary School, in collaboration with their DPW, has been recycling for many years. "The thinking was that if we could help children to learn about recycling early on, and hopefully ingrain it as a life habit, then we would raise up a generation of recycling-conscious children," says teacher Bruce McBrien.

The students at AES have been part of the Green Team for years, including arriving early once a week to go through the halls gathering up recycling from all of the classroom bins, which they then deliver to the custodial staff for transfer into the large single-stream bins outside. By making recycling an automatic part of their school lives, the hope is that the students' green behaviors will translate to their lives at home and in their community.

and middle school students.

December 8 – Application deadline for the <u>USDA's Farm to School Grant Program</u>. Schools and school

districts can apply for planning or implementation grants to start or expand a farm to school program.
